Introduction

The purpose of the Celebration Tool Kit is to recognize and celebrate nurses who earn the Certified Neuroscience Registered Nurse (CNRN®) or the Stroke Certified Registered Nurse (SCRN®) credential or complete the Certificate Program for the Seizure and Epilepsy Healthcare Professional.

Certification in any field is a mark of professionalism. Over the last few decades, it has become increasingly clear that nursing certification advances the profession of nursing by encouraging and recognizing professional achievement. There are now more than 800,000 nurses certified by the American Board of Nursing Specialties, and this number increases significantly each year (*Impact of Nursing Certification on Nurses, Healthcare Employers and Patients*).

Specialty nursing certification and education distinguishes nurses from their colleagues, facilitates a sense of professional accomplishment, and is Magnet-recognized.

About the American Board of Neuroscience Nursing (ABNN)

Our Mission and Vision

ABNN's mission is to promote and advance the practice of neuroscience nursing through specialty certification. ABNN's vision is that every person with neurological health needs receives care from ABNN-certified registered nurses.

Our Goal

ABNN's goal is to recognize neuroscience and stroke specialty certifications as the standard of care.

Our Purpose

- Encourage the study of neuroscience nursing.
- Promote and advance the practice of neuroscience nursing through specialty certification.
- Determine minimum requirements for individuals who seek certification in neuroscience nursing and its subspecialties.
- Conduct examinations for certification of qualified candidates.
- Provide a mechanism for recertification in neuroscience nursing and its subspecialties.

Who We Are

ABNN is the independent, not-for-profit corporation established to design, implement, and evaluate certification programs for professional nurses involved in the specialty practice of neuroscience nursing and its subspecialties.

Our Role in Certification

ABNN is solely responsible for the development, administration, and evaluation of the CNRN and SCRN certification and recertification programs. Certification provides a path for nurses to demonstrate specialty knowledge and expertise in clinical practice and serve as role models to others. This is accomplished through specialized, scientifically developed exams incorporating neuroscience and stroke nursing clinical practice. The examination outlines are based on periodic job analysis or role delineation studies that identify the knowledge and experiences required of a practicing neuroscience or stroke nurse.

Our Role in the Certificate Program

The Certificate Program for the Seizure and Epilepsy Healthcare Professional is a joint project between the American Association of Neuroscience Nurses (AANN) and ABNN. AANN is solely responsible for the development of the educational content, and ABNN is solely responsible for the development of the post-assessments and the certificate of added qualification.

ABNN Certifications

CNRN

The CNRN credential represents specialized experience and knowledge in the care of patients with neurological trauma and illness. Earned and maintained by more than 4,400 nurses, the credential benefits patients, peers, and hospital administrators in recognizing unique abilities in caring for a very special patient population.

An eligible candidate

- must be engaged in neuroscience nursing clinical practice or employed as an administrator, consultant, educator, or researcher
- will have completed the equivalent of at least 1 year (2,080 hours) of full-time direct or indirect neuroscience nursing practice as a registered nurse (RN) within the last 3 years.

Eligible RNs engaged in the care of neuroscience patients earn the CNRN credential after successful completion of the 220-item CNRN certification examination.

The CNRN certification program is accredited by the Accreditation Board for Specialty Nursing Certification (ABSNC), the only nationally recognized accrediting body for specialty nursing certification programs. The examination is based on periodic role delineation studies that identify the knowledge and experience required of a practicing neuroscience nurse.

SCRN

The SCRN credential represents specialized experience and knowledge in the care of stroke patients. Earned and maintained by more than 6,500 nurses, the credential benefits patients, peers, and hospital administrators in recognizing unique abilities in caring for a very special patient population.

An eligible candidate

- must be engaged in stroke nursing clinical practice or employed as an administrator, consultant, educator, or researcher
- will have completed the equivalent of at least 1 year (2,080 hours) of full-time direct or indirect stroke nursing experience within the last 3 years.

Eligible RNs engaged in the care of stroke patients earn the SCRN credential after successful completion of the 170-item SCRN certification examination.

The SCRN certification program is accredited by the ABSNC, the only nationally recognized accrediting body for specialty nursing certification programs. The examination is based on periodic role delineation studies that identify the knowledge and experience required of a practicing stroke nurse.

Seizure and Epilepsy Healthcare Professional Certificate

The Certificate Program for the Seizure and Epilepsy Healthcare Professional is an assessment-based certificate program that uses instructional design principles to deliver an online self-study educational course followed by post-assessments.

The primary purpose of this certificate program is to equip healthcare professionals with the foundational knowledge to provide evidence-based care to patients who have seizures and epilepsy, who are admitted to an epilepsy monitoring unit (EMU), and who are being evaluated for and/ or undergoing surgery for medically refractory epilepsy. There are six online modules, presented sequentially, to be completed to earn the certificate. The post-assessment is 50 questions in length.

Two optional modules provide information on a nurse's role in a comprehensive epilepsy specialty clinic and an EMU. The completion of these two additional modules will enhance the professional's and facility's ability to care for patients admitted to a comprehensive epilepsy center or EMU and will meet the qualifications for National Association of Epilepsy Centers accreditation. The post-assessment is 70 questions in length.



Display a Plaque

Recognize the CNRNs or SCRNs at your institution with the official CNRN or SCRN Institution Plaque. Each plaque features a large brass plate engraved with the credential, your institution's name, and a description of the CNRN or SCRN certification. Celebrate Certified Nurses Day

- patient and staff advocacy
- promotion of the certification.

Nominations are due at the end of October each year.

ABNN's Hospital Registration Program

ABNN's Hospital Registration Program is an employer program designed to help nurses earn CNRN or SCRN certification.

- There is no minimum number of nurses required to test per year.
- There is no cost for employers to join.
- Nurses can test with no out-of-pocket fee.
- Enrolled employers pay monthly exam invoices after the nurse takes the exam. The employer receives a \$100 discount for nurses who are unsuccessful in passing the examination.
- Nurses and employers receive free, ongoing program guidance to help promote the certifications.
- Enrolled employers also can receive group discounts on AANN's online review courses.
